Urmila Chaudhary

Urmila Chaudhary is a member of the Tharu people, grew up in South-West Nepal, and was only five or six years old when her

"Kamlari" means "hard-working woman" in English. Girls between the ages of six and 16 are sold or leased to wealthy families by their parents. The parents thereby receive a small income of 40 to 50 US dollars per annum. The girls are serfs, without any rights at all. 16-hour working days, most frequently in the home but also as agricultural labourers, are the norm. They are not allowed to attend school.

Urmila Chaudhary was also denied any schooling. She taught herself to read during the time of her imprisonment. She obtained her freedom at the age of 17. For the first time in her life, she was now able to attend a school.

In 2010, she co-founded a charitable association, the "Freed Kamlari Development Forum" (FKDF), of which she later became the president. The girls give theatre workshops on trauma, plan empowerment campaigns, organise demonstrations and, through to their educational work, have managed to free more than 13,000 girls from Nepalese households.

In order to focus on her own education, Urmila Chaudhary gave up the presidency of the FKDF, but remains involved in the association's activities. Her great dream is to study law, become a lawyer and fight on behalf of young Nepalese girls and their future prospects.

For her services and as a representative of the "Freed Kamlari Development Forum", this women's advocate is now being presented with the Alice Salomon Award. Current president of FKDF is Sunita Kumari Chaudhary who will also take part in the awards
